WEDNESDAY AT THE WELL

Wednesday at the Well meals resumed on Wednesday, September 11, for fall. We need meal workers in the following categories:



MUSICIANS NEEDED

MEALS ON WHEELS

Meals on Wheels (Combined Community Action (CCA) Senior Nutrition Program) food distribution will be coming to our church, starting about October 1. The site director Shari Mailen has been hired by Meals on Wheels.

All meals are cooked and prepared by Valley Services Inc. in Austin, Texas. Hot food is transported in insulated food containers by company vans to the sites. At our Fellowship Hall, Meals on Wheels will repackage it for each recipient, then send it out for delivery. Some meals come frozen so hot meal deliveries are only provided three to five days a week, but recipients get a week of meals.

With the new site, Meals on Wheels is looking for qualified people to deliver to. Recipients must be 60 years of age or older and be home-bound (unable to drive and be unable to leave home without assistance and not have help in the home with cooking of noon meals). Disabled persons under 60 who are on Medicaid may be eligible to receive meals with a referral from their caseworker.

They also need drivers to deliver meals and smiles, typically within 10 miles of the church. You choose the days you can work. Even one day per week or per month helps. Core days/times are Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. To volunteer, contact Shari Mailen at 979-716-6657.



The Stewardship of Life

Homeless in Obedience

In Genesis 6 - 9, we meet a man who obeyed the Lord despite the cost. Chapter 6, verses 5-8 tells us how thoroughly rotten people had become, so bad that the Lord regretted His creating them. But Noah found grace in God's sight.

Then God gave Noah an order that was as foreign to his ear as it would be if God told me to build a space ship in my back yard. At a time when it had never rained, God told Noah to build an ark -- a floating RV -- big enough to save a sample of man, God's prize creation, and of the different animals and birds. Noah didn't know that water was trapped both in the atmosphere and in the earth that would be released on God's command, but Noah believed God and obeyed. His obedience cost Noah his home, the only one he had ever known, and 100 years of his life's labor. I believe that Noah did not obey because he understood, but rather he gained understanding because he obeyed.

Consider what Noah gave up in order to obey God. He gave up life as he knew it. He must have been ridiculed by everyone who knew him, except possibly his wife, their sons, and their sons' wives. He gave up his prospect for living out a normal life span of 900-some years. He gave up what comfort and stability he would have expected for an elderly man of that time.

On the other hand, consider what Noah gained by his obedience. He gained new status as head of God's crowning creation. He lived long enough to see man and animals off to a new beginning with a promise never again to be destroyed by rain and flood. Genesis 8:20 - 9:17 And he gained a new home with a different set of rules to live by.

It is not difficult to identify people who follow the example of Noah by giving up the comfort and stability of life "at home" in obedience to a higher call. The earliest ministers I met and heard were student missionaries who gained practice in ministry by serving at small rural churches such as the one I attended. They made themselves available for ministry wherever needed, with no promise of a stable home -- they learned obedience by obeying. As I grew in faith, I had many opportunities to get to know missionaries, some as they served on the mission field, some as they became interested in missions and progressed to decades of faithful service. Not once did I hear them complain about not having a "home." Most of them felt more at home on the mission field than they did where they grew up. All of us can grow in faith by supporting, encouraging, and praying for those who serve in our own church and on the mission field.




SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

"Meals on Wheels" IS Coming to Your COMMUNITY



Combined Community Action Senior Nutrition Program, also known as "Meals on Wheels", serves hot-nutritional noon meals to persons who are 60 years of age and older in either a congregate setting for those seniors more mobile or delivers meals to the those who are home-bound. Currently "Meals on Wheels" has 20 serving sites in 6 different counties in the central Texas region and is seeking to expand their service to your community.

WHO CAN GET MEALS? People 60 years of age and over!

ELIGIBILITY

Congregate meals - persons must be 60 years of age or older, or the spouse (regardless of age) or an eligible client. Disabled persons under 60, who live with an eligible client, or live in within the housing authority we serve, may come to the site with the client and eat.

Home delivered meals - persons must be 60 years of age or older and be home-bound (unable to drive and be unable to leave home without assistance and not have help in the home with cooking of noon meals). Disabled persons under 60 who are on Medicaid may be eligible to receive meals with a referral from their caseworker.

COST OF MEALS

The cost of a meal is a voluntary donation of \$2.00. If a person is unable to give the full contribution, they may give what they can afford and will not be denied a meal. All meals are cooked and prepared by Valley Services Inc. in Austin, Texas. Hot food is transported in insulated food containers by company vans to the sites.


